^{2.} The CPI(A) and the CPI(B) are based on the expenditure patterns of 50% and 30%, respectively, of urban households in Hong Kong, which were derived from the 1984/85 Household Expenditure Survey. The CPI(A) refers to households spending between \$2,000 and \$6,499 a month at that time and the CPI(B) between \$6,500 and \$9,999 a month.

Movements of the CPIs by section of commodity/service

- 3. Compared with August 1988, the index for services increased by 3.7% in CPI(A) and by 3.2% in CPI(B) and that for foodstuffs, by 1.4% in both CPI(A) and CPI(B). The index for housing increased by 1.6% in CPI(A) and by 0.6% in CPI(B). Price movements in other sections were insignificant.
- 4. The changes in the section indexes for September 1988 as compared with August 1988 and their contribution to the change in the all-items index are shown below:-

Major price movements in September 1988

- 5. During September, school fees, textbook prices, rents for some public and private housing units, retail prices of fresh vegetables and fresh fruit, and charges for meals in restaurants and other eating places increased.
- 6. The index for foodstuffs increased by 1.4% in both CPI(A) and CPI(B). This was mainly due to increases in the average retail prices of fresh vegetables, fresh fruit and moon-cakes and in the average charge for meals in restaurants and other eating places. The effect of movements in the retail prices of other food items on the index for foodstuffs was insignificant.
 - (i) Fresh vegetables The average retail price of fresh vegetables increased by 3.3% in CPI(A) and by 3.8% in CPI(B).
 - (ii) Fresh fruit The average retail price of fresh fruit increased by 2.8% in CPI(A) and by 3.4% in CPI(B) as a result of higher prices of oranges and apples.
 - (iii) Bread, cakes, biscuits and puddings The average retail price of bread, cakes, biscuits and puddings increased by 3.1% in CPI(A) and by 2.9% in CPI(B) due to higher prices of moon-cakes.
 - (iv) Meals bought away from home The average charge for meals in restaurants and other eating places increased by 1.2% in both CPI(A) and CPI(B).
- 7. The index for housing increased by 1.6% in CPI(A) and by 0.6% in CPI(B) as a result of higher rents for some public and private housing units.
- 8. The index for <u>services</u> increased by 3.7% in CPI(A) and by 3.2% in CPI(B) due to higher school fees and textbook prices.


